PRESIDENT'S message

As our society has become more inclusive, the OCA has changed with it, welcoming all who wish to share the joy of camp, regardless of age, ability, background, income or sexuality.

We need to continue to build funds to meet unexpected challenges that may lie ahead.

■ GOVERNMENT ADVOCACY

Many of the concerns and pressing issues facing our camps today are government-related, so we dedicated a lot of time advocating to the government (Temporary Foreign Workers Program, Early Years Act, Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA), etc.).

■ PROMOTING CAMP

In our partnership with The Connected Brand, we've honed our marketing strategy and figured out different ways in which we can better serve our members. This year we developed a task force to begin the process of creating a comprehensive marketing plan to promote Accredited Camps in Ontario. While this process is slow and difficult we are still attempting to reach out to Members and the public in new ways.

■ CRISIS RESPONSE RESOURCE MANUAL

Our outstanding Committee developed a Crisis Response Resource Manual that will empower camp directors to develop their own risk management strategies.

■ STANDARDS

Our Standards and Standards Review Committees have worked tirelessly to further develop and fine-tune our Standards and the Standards Visit process.

■ YEAR-ROUND STANDARDS

Our Members have asked for Year-round Standards that are reasonable and help us operate under the current OCA Standards. This will be particularly helpful for school groups and renters. Our incredible team of Standards Review and Standards Committees have had so much input into the first draft which was emailed to Members at the end of September. Throughout the fall we asked OCA Members to provide their comments. These Standards are for all camps and they need to represent the camps industry. It is important for OCA's Accredited Camps to adhere to the Standards thereby providing a safe environment for everyone at their site at all times, including short-term programs, such as schools. The Year-round Standards is a living document that will continue to change and develop with the support of OCA members and new regulations from the different levels of government.

Two hundred free camp spaces were opened to refugee families across the province. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S message

What a great year this has been!

Working with the Standards Review Chair, Rob Crew, and the Committee to draft the new format for the Year-round Standards has been a huge commitment from all involved in this lengthy process. Volunteers who contributed to this initiative included Miles Villneff, Onondaga Camp and David Ehrlich, Toronto District School Board (Programs); Sari Grossinger, Camp Robin Hood (Campsite, Facilities and Equipment); Larry Bell and Ehren Gluckstein, Camp Robin Hood (Transportation); Leon and Max Muszynski, Camp Arowhon, (Trips and Excursions and Food Services); Brandon McClounie, YMCA Cedar Glen, and Rob Crew, Sparrow Lake Camp, (Management and Administration, and Challenge Courses); Craig Perlmutter, Camp Tamakwa (Boating); Bev Unger, Chair of the Health Care Committee and the Health Care Committee (Health Care); and, Eric Shendelman (Swimming). Finally, a proposed draft was ready for the 2017 Annual General Meeting (AGM). Before we got to the AGM there were a lot of meetings and time spent on revisions to ensure that all comments and suggestions from Members were taken into consideration. This new format will assist Camps and Standards Visitors with understanding the Standards and with the Camps' Visits.

OCA's database, Wild Apricot, continues to be a very valuable tool for storing historical,

Membership, and Membership Renewal information, sending emails, tracking Standards Visits and outcomes, marketing, registering and paying for events, providing volunteer data and so much more.

This year will be the first time Members will have the opportunity to use an electronic voting system for the 2017 AGM Elections. The process continued for mailing Members a Letter of Notice and a Proxy for people who could not attend the meeting. Also, Members who do not have computers were mailed the full AGM package. Most not-for-profits have moved to electronic voting as it allows Members outside of the Greater Toronto Area (GTA) to be personally involved by casting their votes in this manner.

At this time, there are several other important projects that you will be hearing about including a new Senior Staff Protocol Resource, a revised Health Care Resource, a Tripping Resource Manual and more.

All of the events this year were supported by the generosity of the following Preferred Vendors. The OCA has had another year of sound financial management in the context of significant demands for expenditures for both core services as well as new projects that have demanded our attention this year. Fees grew 14% by a combination of our annual increase in the cost of living as well as by the growth of new Membership. We also made significant strides in increasing special sponsorship and donations as well as in revenues from other activities such as advertising and educational events. Overall our revenues were \$630,953. Our expenses were \$614,483.50 and we realized a net operating surplus of \$25,470.12. Our financial goal is to replenish our reserves in accordance with the reserve requirements of Ontario non-profit organizations.

On the expenditure front, continued prudent management of all aspects of the OCA operation has allowed the OCA to come in under budget on overall expenses. Staffing costs were slightly higher than budgeted due to increases in health benefit costs for employees and the contract salaries of staff for critical projects during the year. Program expenses were in excess of budgeted amounts but these were offset by higher than expected revenues for activities that were made possible by these expenses. The Annual Conference, the Health Care Conference, and the Counsellor Conference all had revenues that were higher than expected and are a reflection of their overwhelming success. Office and general expenses contain line items that allowed

our executive director some flexibility over the year in budgeting and expenses. In that context marketing and advertising were significantly lower than budgeted while government lobbying on the Temporary Foreign Worker Program issue as well as the Ontario Early Years Act were higher than budgeted. It should be noted that a special call for contributions from Members to assist in the establishment of a "war chest" went out in the spring and close to \$15,000 was collected and deposited in a reserve fund in order to prepare for lobbying efforts that we know are to come this year. Occupancy expenses were on budget as was spending on Committees.

I am proud to be able to report a successful financial year once again for the OCA and wish to thank our Executive Director, Heather Heagle, for her careful financial management and her expert budgeting and financial record keeping. She makes my work as the OCA Treasurer very easy indeed.

- To promote the importance and value of archives in the camping community.
- To encourage and facilitate the camps and camping groups in Ontario.
- To encourage Ontario Camps Association (OCA) and Member Camps to contribute archival materials, and to facilitate their transfer to the Camps Archives at Trent University.
- To actively create archival materials through Oral History Interviews and other projects.

GOALS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS 2015–16

The Archives Committee continues to support the work of OCA Archives at the Thomas J. Bata Library at Trent University. An October 2015 article in the Trent University's Archives News stated, "The archival holdings date from 1902 to the present and include photographs, pamphlets and brochures, correspondence, minutes of meetings, standards records, camp manuals, articles and reports, and audio and video tapes."

Our camping records are heavily used by researchers of all sorts: undergraduate, MA, and PhD students; authors; OCA administrators; and camping enthusiasts. Indeed, according to Bernadine Doge and Bruce W. Hodgins, "The recognition of the summer camp as an educational as well as

recreational institution, and its role in the character development of male and female campers, invites an investigation into its history from a variety of perspectives." Currently, the OCA records comprise approximately 40 linear metres, a substantial holding for our repository. The records continue to grow year after year, building on the first acquisition received almost half a century ago.

The OCA support of the Trent Archives includes the ongoing "Brown Bag Program" and currently includes a multi-year digitization project funded by the OCA. This entails transferring dozens of audio tapes to a digital format; the tapes date from 1970 and are of interviews with prominent people in the camping movement.

A proposed new project is an Archives Recognition Award, to be awarded to a group or an individual who has made an outstanding contribution to the OCA Archives.

The Committee would like to acknowledge the very strong support received from the OCA office and Heather Heagle in our communication and liaison with Trent University.

PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT BETWEEN CANADIAN CAMPING ASSOCIATION AND AMERICAN CAMP ASSOCIATION

Jill Dundas, CCA President, and Stephen Fine, CCA Research Chair, travelled to Atlanta in early February 2016 for the ACA National Conference to meet with Tom Holland (CEO) and Tish Bolger (ACA President) to address a partnership arrangement between the CCA and the ACA for collaborative research opportunities and the sharing of research and evaluation tools and resources. An agreement has been reached and ratified by both the CCA and the ACA Boards. The launch is to be announced early in 2017.

SUMMER CAMP HEALTH INITIATIVE (SCHI)

A meeting took place at the 2016 ACA National Conference with Linda Erceg, RN, Ph.D., on advancing the progress of the Canadian Health Initiative in conjunction with the Association of Camp Nurses (ACN). Canadian camp nurse Bev Unger was the recipient of the ACN Camp Nurse of the Year Award. The focus will be on Ontario camps for the onset. THE CAMP EXPERIENCE: LEARNING THROUGH THE OUTDOORS.

REDRESSING FIRST NATIONS STEREOTYPING AT CAMPS

In the spring of 2016, a delegation that included Heather Heagle, Executive Director - Ontario Camps Association; Jill Dundas, President - Canadian Camping Association; John Jorgenson, President - International Camping Fellowship; Tad McIlwraith, Professor - Guelph University; John Andras, Representative - Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada; Stephen Fine, Research Chair - Canadian Camping Association; and Bishop Mark MacDonald, National Indigenous Anglican Bishop - Anglican Church of Canada, convened at Church House in Toronto.

The meeting was held to address the mimicry of First Nations ceremonies and practices that are a tradition at many summer camps across the country. Recently, First Nations representatives have publicly expressed indignation citing these types of camp practices as disrespectful, and aiding in the spread of racial stereotyping among young people. It was agreed that all present would work through their respective organizations to redress this issue.

- To provide the camp industry with updates on changes to government legislation, both provincially and federally, prior to the proposed regulations becoming law;
- To ensure that OCA and CCA have an opportunity to have a voice, at any legislative table or in any community, to allow us to impact draft legislation that could affect the Camp community;
- To work with all levels of government, associations/organizations to inform them of this vital robust industry and the impact OCA's Members have on the residents of Ontario;
- To lobby the government with respect to prospective changes to legislation that will or have already impacted summer camps.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS 2015–16

This year the Committee hired a new government relations firm that is better suited to deal with the current needs of the OCA. Their advice so far has proven to be outstanding.

Together, we have created a long-term relationship with CCA in terms of working together such that overall government relations strategies will be organized through CCA with OCA and provincial associations' input. We expect this will be further developed in the coming months.

There has been a commitment from the Liberal government to interpret the religious/charitable exemption for the Temporary Foreign Worker Program, in as flexible and liberal a manner as possible, as a short-term solution to the challenges of this new legislation.

Second, the government has made a commitment to discuss a long term solution to the concerns of the Temporary Foreign Worker Program. The Liberal government has confirmed in writing that they will be meeting with us in the fall of 2016 to discuss a permanent solution that they have been working on during the summer that they hope will allow camps to meet their goals within the auspices of the challenges of the current foreign worker program.

GOALS 2016–17

We will continue to lobby the government on the issues regarding foreign workers. Once again in the spring we had to arduously work with government officials to convince them to communicate to border officials to interpret the wording of the religious/charitable exemption in a more flexible manner. In the end after some difficulty we were able to get in all of the foreign staff. We believe we will be in a position to begin discussions to make changes to this legislation in the fall that finally will make our typical spring challenges minimal.

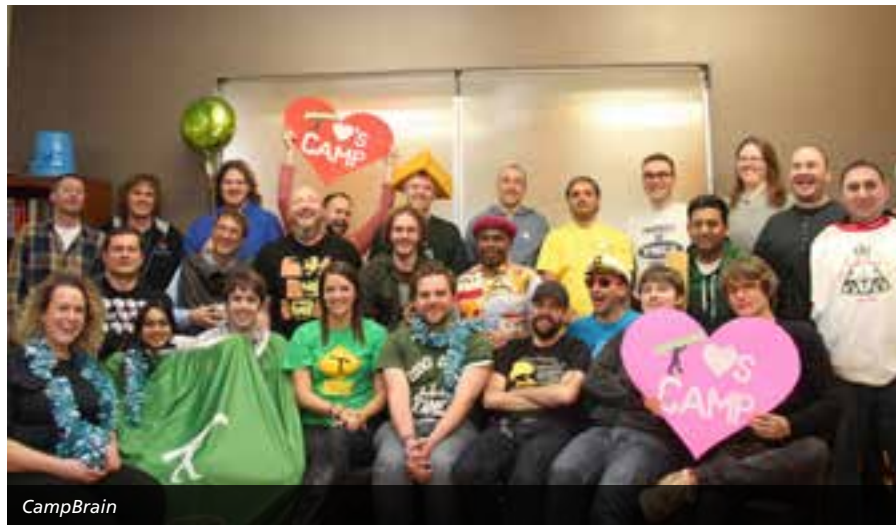

The OCA Standards Review Committee works closely with the Standards Committee. The committee monitors current recreation practices and government legislations to ensure that the OCA Standards are current and reflect the industry's best practices.

GOALS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS 2015–16

OCA's Standards are truly a living document always growing and evolving to stay pertinent. To that end, the Standards Review and Standards Committees, plus an ad hoc committee of experts from the Toronto District School Board and OCA's Members have met over the past two years to create Year-round Standards that would apply to camps that provide programs outside of the summer season. Currently, OCA's Standards only address Summer Camp operations. A draft of these newly formatted Year-round Standards were completed in the fall of 2016 allowing time for them to

be presented and discussed with the OCA Board Members and OCA Accredited Camp Members. The Standards themselves have not been changed at this time. The positive outcome using this new format is to clearly define areas of responsibilities at different times of the year which will be a helpful tool for all camps. Thank you to everyone who has contributed to this undertaking.

In 2016, we also made recommendations for a number of new Standards pertaining to Occupational Health and Safety, the new Ontario Bear Wise Program and the Early Years Act.

GOALS 2015–16

- Continue to work with the Government Relations Committee to monitor government legislation
- Continue to seek feedback from the Membership regarding Standards
- Communicate with the Membership around any changes within the Standards
- Explore various ways to make the Standards more accessible to our Members, both in print and electronically
